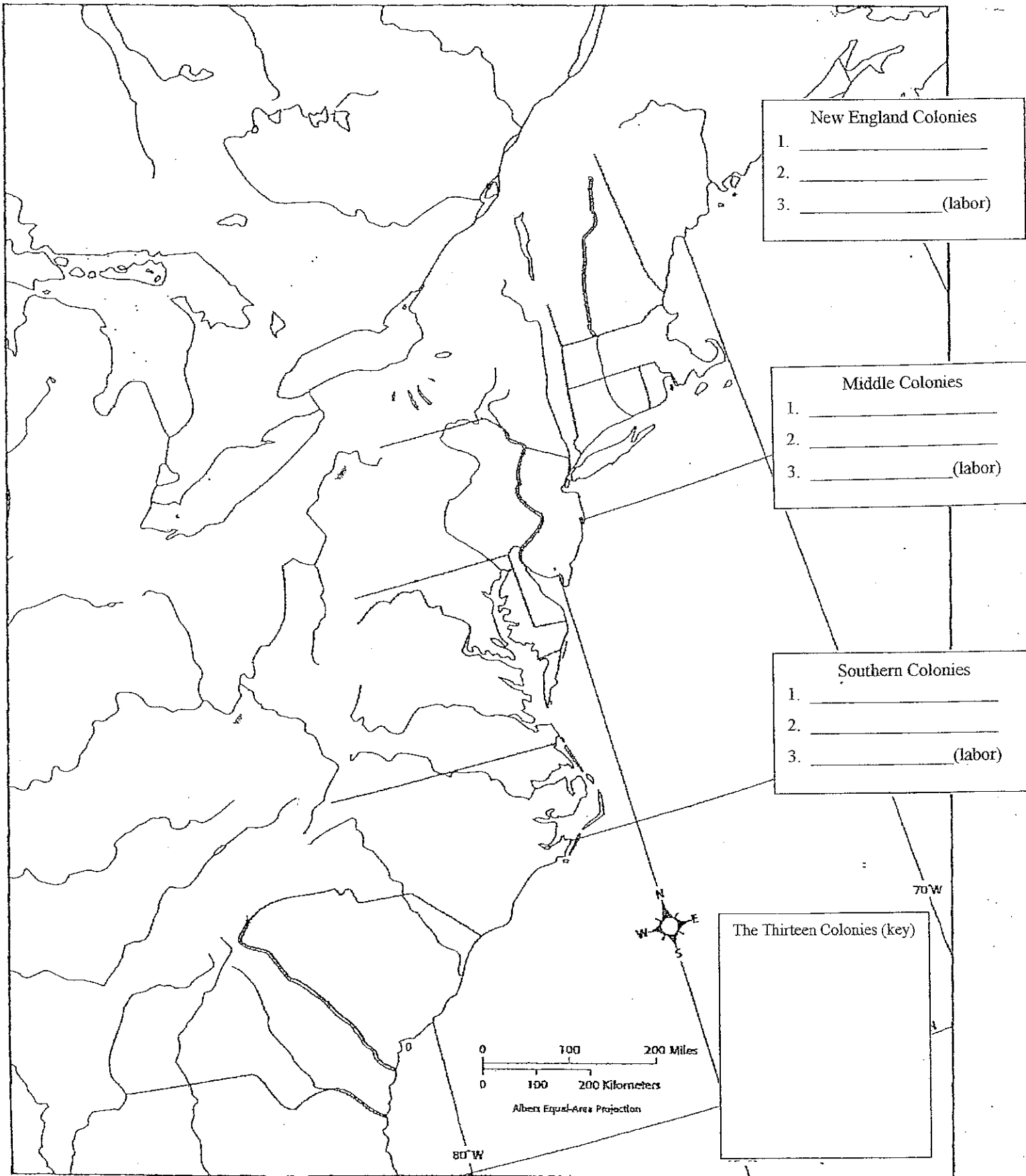

The Thirteen Colonies
[Circa 1750]

This is a map of the thirteen colonies 150 years after the founding of Jamestown, as they were before the French and Indian War. As you complete it, think about how the physical features of the colonies contributed to the development of a variety of political, religious, and economic characteristics.

Use the maps on pages 73, 76, 89, 91 in your textbook *and* our classroom map for reference. Use the mapping format that you have learned this year and complete the map according to the following directions.

1. Label each of the thirteen colonies. Then outline and shade each of the colonies, using different colors so that their boundaries are distinct. *For some of the colonies there is no defined western border. At the time English land claims stretched from sea to sea. The Appalachian Mountains provided a natural border for the colonies. Use the map on page 91 to determine those borders.*
