

Louisiana Purchase and Exploration

In 1803 President Thomas Jefferson dramatically increased the territory of the United States by approving the purchase of Louisiana from France. Congress authorized the Lewis and Clark Expedition to explore the new territory and find a water route to the Pacific. Although there was no direct water route to the Pacific, the expedition recorded a wealth of scientific data about the newly acquired land and staked the claim of the Unites States to the Oregon Territory in the Pacific Northwest. In 1806 Jefferson sent Zebulon Pike on an expedition to find the starting point of the Red River, which marked the new border with Spanish territorial claims.

1. Outline the area of the United States and its territories in 1804; use one color	/3
